I have made special efforts to put in place extra pieces to my support system to ensure I can continue being a good pastoral leader. I also make sure to mix in some fun. cathartic music, and good laughs with other aspects of ministry so the sadness is not quite as bad. That being said, I pray that all of you do not hesitate to seek time with God, with me to talk about it or pray, or in worship to hear the Word of God speak to your hearts. If grief hits hard or seems unmanageable at times, it is important to also seek a professional licensed counselor. We



all deal with the waves of grief differently and it includes waves of sadness, denial, peace, depression, anger, and acceptance. They are rarely in any particular

order as well.



We have an advantage as people of God in the midst of all of this --God! As believers, we have faith and hope in our Creator and Almighty God. We may go through doubts. After all, we are only human. We remain thankful though for the gift of HOPE in eternal life! Death is not the end. It does not get the last word! It is not even the last

He has raised them all to NEW LIFE! How exciting to look forward to being with the communion of saints again one day! Advent and Christmas are the perfect end to our year. It is the perfect time to remember we are NOT ALONE. We DO NOT NEED to be afraid. Emmanuel, Christ, is with us. The human child is about to be born so that God would be able to give us the GIFT OF LOVE on the cross. LOVE IN DEATH, and LOVE, SO POWERFUL, IT RAISES US TO NEW LIFE! There is NOTHING that can every separate us as children of God, from our Lord! Thanks be to God! Amen.


From the Archives: Building of the Church

Thank you for participating in the 2025 Northwest Elementary School Classroom Wish List campaign. Delivery of all of the donations to Northwest Elementary was made on November 24, 2025. The magnitude of your generosity is reflected in the inventory of donations listed below. Santa Clase was a Real Person!

Santa Clase is a another way of saying Saint Nicolas, whose life the Church commemorates on December 6th. There has been multiple stories and legends told about him over centuries. What is actually known about him is that he was born in the late 3rd century in Patara, a village on the southern coast of today's Turkey. He was orphaned as a boy and raised by his devout Christian grandparents. As a young man he became a priest and shortly afterwards was elect the Bishop of Myra, a city near Patara. He was imprisoned during the persecution of Christians under Roman Emperor Diocletian. After Christianity became legal by Emperor Constantine, Nicholas attended the Council at Nicaea in 325. He died on December 6, 343.


Because his father was a wealthy merchant, Nicholas inherited a large fortune when he came of age. Yet Nicolas lived simply, choosing to aid those in need as they came to his attention by giving anonymous gifts from his inheritance. But his generosity did not remain a secret.

The story told is that a very poor family had three daughters who were reaching marrying age. The Roman custom at the time was that the father of a young woman had to provide a dowery to her perspective husband. Without a dowery a girl had virtually no chance of marriage, resulting in a life of destitution or even being sold into slavery. Nicolas heard of these girls' plight and just as each sister reached marrying age, he crept up to their house in the dark of night and dropped a bag of gold through an open window for her dowery. A plot was hatched to



discover who was engaged in such generosity. Knowing that the donor had put a bag of gold through the girls' window twice before, some men hid in wait for the mysterious person to arrive for the third time. So Nicolas was caught in his act of charity.

Word spread rapidly of Nicolas' benevolences, especially to the children in and near Myra. Others began imitating Nicolas, particularly by giving anonymous gifts on December 6th. When ask who these gifts were from, the answer was, "They are from St. Nicolas." So as the custom spread from country to country it took many forms. In many places, since the Christ child received gifts upon his birth, the giving of gifts to children by St. Nicolas became associated with Christmas.



Turn old Christmas cards into beautiful keepsake ornaments! It's a fun, simple way to give new life to cards you've received and add a handmade touch to your tree.


What you need:

- Christmas cards
- Scissors
- Glue
- Circle pattern (cut from cardboard or trace around object)
- Hole punch
- · Yarn or ribbon
- Glitter (optional)

What you do:

- 1. Trace a circle onto two Christmas cards.
- Cut out the circles and glue the backs together.
- Decorate the edges with glitter or ribbon for extra sparkle.
- Punch a hole at the top and thread yarn or ribbon through to hang.







What you need:

- A strand of Christmas lights
- A large clear plastic container and lid
- Green tissue paper
- Colorful beads

What you do:

- Plug in the lights and place them in the container.
- Put on the lid. (If the lid isn't transparent, flip the box over.)
- Play with your light box, using these ideas as starters:
 - Cut tissue paper into triangles and arrange them in a tree shape.
 Decorate the tree with colorful beads.
 - Use the light box for tracing. Place a picture on it, with a clean sheet of paper on top. Then trace the drawing.
 - Use magnet tiles to build designs atop the light box.
