

In the event that St. James would choose to merge with us, that would change the nature of our transition work together. Please keep the faithful saints of St. James in your prayers as they consider where God is leading them next.

The use of the word saints is intentional as we will soon celebrate the festival of All Saints. Traditionally, it is assumed that this is a festival to remember the faithful saints who have died. It certainly is that.

In-person worship is at 9:00 am. **Masking is optional.** *Anyone with symptoms, a positive test for Covid-19, or exposure to someone with Covid-19 should not come to church or enter the building.*

The parking lot door will be the only door open for entry and exit. As you enter you will pick up a bulletin.

For the safety of our members and those using our facilities, we will continue to monitor the Covid-19 situation locally and, if the situation warrants, reevaluate our masking policy.

Radio Worship Service:

There will be a radio broadcast of the service available to those who are parked just outside of the church, either in the parking lot or on the street. Just tune your radio to 88.5. Communion packets and bulletins are available inside the parking lot door at the back of the church.

Online Worship Service:

Our online worship will continue to be available. As we begin in-person worship we will stream it through YouTube. Here you will find links to the live-stream, the bulletin, and the replay of the service so that you can watch at any time you wish during the week.

Council Notes

Highlights of Church Council Meeting September 22, 2022

- The year-to-date actual budget balance at the end of July was in the black, although a deficit of \$8000 was noted for August. The positive year-to-date balance is due to previously received dividends from some of our investments.
- The success of the Forward in Faith campaign will be celebrated on October 23 with a luncheon. At that time, a congregational meeting will also be held to vote on setting aside the Lehman Street entrance project so that the funds can be used for other expenses, such as the roof.
- Pastor Tim has been in contact with the Reverend Richard Jorgenson, Acting Bishop of the Lower Susquehanna Synod, regarding the next steps in our call process. Pastor Tim will be setting up specific congregational meetings to discuss our hopes for the future and how we perceive God at work in our congregation. Three meetings will likely be held; it is hoped that Pastor Jorgenson will be able to attend one of the meetings. Attendance by congregation members is strongly encouraged.
- The members of Saint James Lutheran Church in Lebanon will be attending our worship service on October 2 and/or October 16 as they discern the future direction for their congregation.
- Worship and Music Committee is recommending one worship service on Christmas Eve at 7:00 PM. Since Christmas is on Sunday this year, they also recommend that we have no service on Christmas morning. There is a lock-in planned for the youth on New Year's Eve, with a suggestion that the youth conduct the worship service the following morning, New Year's Day.
- Bradley Bishop was recommended by Finance Committee to assume the position of Church Treasurer. His recommendation was approved by Council. Sue Kulakowski, current Treasurer, is retiring and has agreed to assist Bradley during the transition.
- Joel Zinn from Zinn Insurance attended the meeting as a guest. He reviewed our current insurance policy which is coming up for renewal and answered questions related to the policy.

Highlights of Church Council Meeting October 20, 2022

- Pastor Scott Paradise, Dean of the Lebanon Conference, Lower Susquehanna Synod, attended the meeting to obtain feedback on our congregation's interaction with the members of Saint James Lutheran Church, Lebanon, who attended our worship services on October 2 and October 16. Dean Paradise relayed that the members of Saint James found our congregation to be welcoming and hospitable. Saint James will be closing in the near future.
- The majority of items related to our transition to a called pastor will be put on hold temporarily until we are clearer on our relationship with Saint James. We can then create opportunities for conversation and listening sessions to discuss our vision for the future.
- Pastor Tim will be on vacation the week of November 14-20. Pastor Melody Sell will serve as our supply pastor on Sunday, November 20. Pastor Scott Paradise has volunteered to be available for pastoral emergencies.
- Brad Bishop was introduced as our new Church Treasurer.
- Property Committee noted that the front pews in the sanctuary create a safety issue at times due to the limited amount of space for the bell ringers' tables, as well as access to the baptismal font. There is also limited room at the base of the steps. It was noted that creating more space in the front of the church has been discussed in the past. The committee recommended that both front pews be removed and stored to allow for better accessibility, as well as placement of Pastor Tim's table. One pew was removed without difficulty, as a trial. Council approved the removal of the two front pews.
- Pastor Tim would like to create a Mutual Ministry Committee, as well as a Personnel Committee.
- The success of the Forward in Faith campaign will be celebrated on October 23 with a luncheon. At that time, a congregational meeting will also be held to vote on setting aside the Lehman Street entrance project so that the funds can be used for other expenses, such as needed roof repairs.

From the Archives The First *Trinity Tidings*

The first *Trinity Tidings* newsletter was published 111 years ago in October 1911. We have Rev. Arthur T. Michler, Holy Trinity's fourth pastor (1910-1914), to thank for this. As editor-in-chief, he wrote: "We have long felt that a parish paper such as this would be of great value to our people. Here we can inform our members of the general condition of the church, a matter which only too few have any extended knowledge. To show what we are doing, what we ought to do and what we hope to do in all departments of our activities and to secure the co-operation of ALL of our members is the purpose of this little paper. For the present it will be published about every two months. Every family is to be given a copy."

Measuring 6 ¼ inches wide by 9 ½ inches tall (a bit narrower and taller than our present day Sunday bulletin) and consisting of only four printed pages, the first issue of *Trinity Tidings*, without today's eye-catching graphics, photos and color, is rather plain-looking but full of information.

Some of the happenings reported in the first *Trinity Tidings*:

At the October 8th Sunday morning service 213 people received communion, "an increase over the fall communion of a year ago, which numbered 173," and the Church received \$78.46, "of which \$26.15 was contributed [to the regular thanksgiving offering] for the benevolent works of the Church." That afternoon the Bible School held its annual Rally with 315 in attendance. The special program included the church orchestra, a solo by Miss Edith Frantz, and songs by the Primary Department. The Women's Division of the Pastor's Bible Class outnumbered the Men's Division, whose intent to do better in the future was stated.

Mentioned are the baptism of one-year old John Yale Bixler on October 1st, the wedding of Mr. Harvey M.

SUNDAY, OCTOBER 8th.

This was a day full of interest to the members of Trinity. At the morning service the blessed Sacrament of the Lord's Supper was administered to 213 of our people. This is an increase over the fall communion of a year ago, which numbered 173. If numbers are an indication, this communion shows a growing appreciation of this precious gift of God to His people. On this day the Church asked for its regular thanksgiving offering, for benevolence. The receipts from all sources were \$78.46, of which \$26.15 was contributed for the benevolent works of the Church.

In the afternoon, at 2 o'clock, the Bible School held its annual Rally. A special program of interest had been prepared which was carried out in full. The orchestra, under the able leadership of Mr. Frank Nagle, rendered excellent service. The solo of Miss Edith Frantz was highly appreciated. The address of the afternoon was delivered by the Hon. John R. Fertig. It was timely, full of enthusiasm and attentively listened to. More should have heard it. The Primary Department acquitted themselves creditably and demonstrated how well they can sing. The Pastor's Bible Class took on new life and was largely represented in the Women's Division. They elected the following Officers: President, Mrs. D. P. Rodearmel; Secretary, Mrs. Lydia Honafius; Treasurer, Mrs.

Robert Kohr. The Men's Division was ably represented, but not as largely as they intend to make it in the future. The men are coming out and soon they will make the women work to keep up.

Our attendance was 315 with an offering of \$16.17 for the Building Fund. While our attendance was not up to the standard of last year (360) the spirit and earnestness manifested by both officers and members was commendable. When such occasions as these are planned we must ALL work together and sacrifice ourselves for the cause of Christ and His Church.

PREPARING FOR CONFIRMATION

The time has arrived when the Church begins her religious instruction of those desiring church membership. This is most fitting and proper; for the Lutheran has always been a Church careful to properly train and inform her youth in spiritual matters. She is a Church who loves her young people; for they are the future Congregation. Our own Congregation began this most important work on the evening of October 5th, when 24 were enrolled for the winter's work.

This year the Pastor will conduct a two or more-year class which is to be a preparatory class preceding the final year before Confirmation. This class will hereafter be known

That 35 members have subscribed to the "Home Missionary" is noted, followed by: "We ought to have 150 subscribers instead of 35. We cannot be well informed Christians unless we take and read the Church's publications."

An announcement of an upcoming lecture on "The Monk That Shook The World" by F. A. Holtzhausen, an authority on Martin Luther, ends with: "Let ALL OF OUR PEOPLE and their friends attend this Reformation Service and pack to the full our church building."

A schedule of church services, an activity calendar, and even more information on other activities and upcoming events fill the four pages of the first *Trinity Tidings*. To think that our present-day newsletter began with that first "little paper" published 111 years ago!



Member Spotlight — The Rev. Kelsey Fitting-Snyder

Greetings Holy Trinity Family,

I am writing to you with words of gratefulness and love from my office in Waco, TX. My husband Jon and I moved to Waco from Davenport, IA, three years ago for Jon to begin his PhD in church music at Baylor University. I am excited to say that Jon will graduate in December. During this time, I have been serving, and continue to serve, the beloved people of St. Matthew Lutheran Church in Waco as their pastor. Our current plans are to remain in Waco, as Jon has taken a full-time job in the libraries at Baylor.

If you can believe it, I celebrated five years of ordained ministry this past summer. I still recall my ordination as part of the Lower Susquehanna Synod Assembly. So many of you were there and some even sang in the choir. But even more than that, I continue to look back at the love of and support you have shown me. It is because of the community of Holy Trinity, that I have made it to where I am today. I also give thanks for the saints who now rest in Christ, who were also a big part of my journey.

During the height of the pandemic I, like many pastors, was seriously reconsidering my sense of call. Not because of my congregation, they were and continue to be supportive, but it was the nature of the pandemic. I was new to the community and new in the role of solo pastor, and all the circumstances had me

questioning everything. It was in my discernment that I thought back to the beginning, and how I got here, and the people who walked with me. Without even knowing it, Holy Trinity grounded me in a way that I was unaware of at the time. I continue to thank you for your prayers.



A quick little anecdote. I was out in the Waco community one night with a friend. We started talking with the people around us. The one guy said he was from a small town in Central PA, but I probably never heard of it. The town, Jonestown. Being similar ages of course we found connections of people that we knew and reminisced about the PA things we miss in Texas (like apple dumplings, or just really good apples for that matter). I share this because Jon and I have lived in four different states now, and we don't know what the future will bring, but Lebanon and Holy Trinity will always be a part of me.

Please know that I think of you all often. I will continue to keep you in my prayers, since as a congregation you are in the midst of transition. I pray for God's peace to be among you, and for God to carry and lift

Recipes FROM THE Church Kitchen

Cajun Chicken Pasta

This recipe was submitted by PJ Copenhaver.

- 2 tablespoons of Olive Oil
- 1 to 1 1/2 pounds of skinless boneless Chicken Thighs cut into bite size pieces
- 2 1/2 teaspoons of Cajun Seasoning
- 1 small to medium thinly sliced Onion
- 2 Green Peppers cut in to 1/4 inch slices
- 2 cloves of Garlic Minced

- 1 pound of uncooked Penne Pasta
- 4 cups of low sodium Chicken Broth
- 14.5 ounce can of Diced Tomatoes
- 1 - 8 ounce block of Cream Cheese, cubed and at room temperature
- Salt and Pepper to taste

Heat the oil in a large wide pot over medium-high heat. Add the chicken and Cajun seasoning and cook, stirring occasionally, until the chicken just starts to change color and the spices are toasted, about 2 minutes.

Add the peppers and onions and cook until they just begin to release some of their juices, 3 to 4 minutes. Stir in the garlic and cook until softened, 1 minute.

Add the pasta, chicken broth and tomatoes and bring to a boil over medium-high heat. When it boils, continue to cook, stirring occasionally, until the pasta is al dente and the sauce is thickened and reduced by about half, about 15 minutes.

Remove from the heat and add the cream cheese and 1 1/2 teaspoons of kosher salt. Stir until the cream cheese is combined and melted. Don't worry if the sauce looks runny, it will thicken as it sits.

Variations:

* Delete Chicken and add Mushroom, Cauliflower, zucchini or squash for Vegetarian. Also change chicken broth to vegetable broth or stock.

*Substitute 1 pound of peeled and deveined shrimp instead of chicken. If so you add the Shrimp in the last 2 to 3 minutes of step 3 to cook the shrimp.

* Andouille Sausage can be added to any meat or seafood variation for that extra Cajun flair.








To find this treasure, go the baptismal font and look up. This set is the fourth set from the left. The window depicts Christian leaders: St. John, St. Mark, St. Luke, and St. Matthew.

St. John. He was one of the closest disciples of Christ and he witnessed the crucifixion and death of our Lord on Calvary. Three crosses are seen behind him reminding us of the Lord's passion. He holds a book in his hands and points to the words Alpha and Omega reminding us that in the beginning of His Gospel he mentions Him as the beginning and the end, referring to Christ our Lord.

St. Mark and St. Luke. They are featured together in the center window. St. Mark has a winged lion as his symbol. The lion is attributed to him because he wrote of the royal dignity of Christ. Luke, on the upper part of the window, has his symbol at his foot and it can be seen behind the figure of St. Mark. The ox, an animal of sacrifice, emphasizes the atonement made through Christ's suffering and death.



St. Matthew. He is on the right. In the bottom part, he is pictured as a winged man. He is often pictured this way because it is thought that his Gospel dwells more on the human side of Jesus Christ than the other Gospel records. Sometimes, however, he is pictured with a book or a pen and an angel in the background dictating or pointing heavenward. In this window, we see a manger at his foot, depicting the birth of Christ. Above his head we see a traveler's staff and a loaf of bread - symbol of Christ going from place to place and becoming our daily bread.
