

Dear Friends in Christ,

I have truly enjoyed my time as your pastor. Thank you for your grace and love. There is much love at Holy Trinity. I've been doing a lot of listening as you share your stories and your experiences.



I've had two meetings now with the church council. We are engaging in a process of visioning and discerning what the focus of this transition period should be about. Pacing is incredibly important. Ordinary time is all about asking ourselves what it means to follow Jesus. Green



Below you will find all of the options for worship as well as what is required to participate.

In-person worship is at 9:00 am. **Masking is optional.** We will continue to distance during church service by seating every other row. Anyone with symptoms, a positive test for Covid-19, or exposure to someone with Covid-19 should not come to church or enter the building.

The parking lot door will be the only door open for entry and exit. As you enter you will pick up a communion packet and bulletin.

For the safety of our members and those using our facilities, we will continue to monitor the Covid-19 situation locally and, if the situation warrants, reevaluate our masking policy.

Radio Worship Service:

There will be a radio broadcast of the service available to those who are parked just outside of the church, either in the parking lot or on the street. Just tune your radio to 88.5. Communion packets and bulletins are available inside the parking lot door at the back of the church.

Online Worship Service:

Our online worship will continue to be available. As we begin in-person worship we will stream it through YouTube. Member Spotlight – Jim Rittle

Jim's life ... no specific order

- July 18, 1936: Born not hatched, Lebanon
- Lifelong resident of Lebanon County
- Son of the late Jacob and Helen (Brubacher) Rittle
- Married Linda Mease, April 28, 1962, Salem EUB (now Covenant UM Church)
- Two children: David and Sue Ann
- Grandchildren: Zachary and Lauren
- Sister: Norma Arnold of Cornwall
- 1954 graduate of Lebanon High School, served on class reunion committees
- 1957 graduate of Wyomissing Polytechnic Institute (Penn State, Berks Campus)
- 1959 received Journeyman Machinist Certificate (4 year apprenticeship) from Textile Machine Works, worked in the needle department for 2 years
- 1998 retired from AMP Inc., Harrisburg, served as design draftsman, machinist, assembly technician and prototype machine assembler
- Child of God Lutheran faith
- Life member of Holy Trinity Lutheran Church – served on Church Council, Sunday School Superintendent, teacher, Brotherhood treasurer, etc.
- Member of circus related organizations: Circus Model Builders Inc. (CMB), Circus Fans Association of America (CFA), Circus World, and International Circus Hall of Fame
- Traveled with Linda to all 48 continental states and various National Parks
- Disney Fan, visited Disney World and Disneyland
- Did what he wanted to do

A life of service and love is one way to sum of Jim Rittle. Many of you knew the love of his life, Linda. Jim's friend, Jack Feaser had a cousin who got married. At the wedding, Linda was in attendance. Their mutual friends decided that Jim would be the guy for Linda and they planned a couple's date. As the date approached, the other couples started to back out. The date quickly became a solo date.

Linda was an only child with a protective father. Her father was all worked up over this date. He grilled her for information about this guy coming to take her out. When Jim knocked on the door, her father's worry was immediately put to rest. They knew each other from the Church Bowling League. The date went well and eventually, the two were married in April of 1962.

Jim convinced Linda to join him at Holy Trinity and they were both very active with the Christian Education and taught various Sunday School classes. Linda was Jim's biggest supporter. She helped him see his passion come to life – model circuses.

When Jim was 7-years-old, he loved trains. So, his dad took him to Reading to see the Ringling Brothers Circus set-up. Jim was mesmerized by the logistics involved. He fell in love with the circus. His love didn't really materialize until around 1989 when he had a heart attack. The life event pushed Jim to decide that if he was going to do something with the circus, he better do it. Linda not only supported his love of model railroading and model circus building, she helped him and even gave up space in the home every year. Jim would start the process of building a

train around Thanksgiving every year. They would move all of the furniture out of their dining room and the models would be ready for Christmas Eve. The display stayed up until February or Linda got sick of it. Linda also helped in the painting of the models and the construction of the displays. The pair traveled to various conventions displaying their circus. Jim is still involved with fans and circus model builders. He keeps in touch with the many friends he has met through their travels and shared passion. The model builder community is not competitive. Their motto is "How can I help?" In keeping with the circus, they never say "goodbye." They say, "See you down the road."

From the Archives Promotion Day 1939



These young children aren't celebrating Independence Day but rather Sunday School Promotion Day. Note the promotion certificates they are holding along with their flags. The photo was taken on Sunday, September 24, 1939. In the Trinity Tidings it was noted: "This is PROMOTION DAY. At the close of the [Bible School] lesson period, 89 pupils will be promoted from one group or department into another. May the Holy Spirit guide each pupil in his or her new experience so that he or she may increase in the knowledge of Christian Truth and improve his or her walk in the Christian Way of Life." These kids look like they have just been promoted from the Nursery Class of the Mother's Dept. into the Beginners' Group, which were children ages 4, 5 and 6. Half of the children are identified on the back of the photo. Front row, 1st on left, Patricia Wentling; 3rd, Barbara Yiengst; 4th, Kay Weaver; 6th, Jane Wagner. Back row, 3rd from left, David Hinckley; 4th, John Feaser; 6th, Ronald Swanger. If you recognize any of the other children, let us know.

The flags seem like an odd feature to a Sunday School promotion. Perhaps they were from a recent Labor Day celebration or a school lesson about the signing of the United States Constitution (on September 17, 1787). Do you know or have any ideas of the reason for the flags?



Featured are one of the sets of stained glass windows that are located in the Sanctuary. If you are standing at the baptismal font - look up. The group is titled, "Three Great Men of the Lutheran Church." The picture on the left depicts Johann Sebastian Bach. Bach's great compositions were devoted to the Church. His music is considered as real glorification of God.

The center picture depicts Martin Luther. Luther is depicted standing in front of a church door ready to put up his "95 Theses." The symbol of Lutheranism is the mystic rose with a red heart and cross in the center. Luther's rose is accepted as a seal of the Lutheran Church.

The picture on the right depicts Henry M. Muhlenberg. Muhlenberg is called the father of the Lutheran Church in America. He is shown holding a Bible in his hand, symbolizing the spread of Lutheranism in this country. A picture of the Trappe Church, which still stands as a living message, can be seen in the lower portion of the window.



PICK A PROJECT – BE INVOLVED

The Women of the ELCA of Holy Trinity are participating in two projects for Lutheran World Relief this year - the assembly of 100 school kits and 100 personal care kits. We welcome members of the congregation to join us in helping to make the School Kits and Personal Care Kits goals. The items needed are listed below. It would be especially helpful to receive assistance with the purchase of 70 to 80 sheet SPIRAL notebooks of wide- or college-ruled paper approximately 8" x 10 1/2". Because each school bag contains 4 spiral notebooks and our goal is to complete 100 school bags we need 400 spiral notebooks. At present we have 21 spiral notebooks toward this goal. In addition if a member of the congregation would like to participate by sewing school bags the instructions for making the school bags can be found on the "in-FORM-ation" table in the Narthex beginning July 3. All donated items can be placed in the WELCA Collection Barrel in The Giving Place from July 3 to September 4. September 4 is the deadline for all donations.

SCHOOL KITS

For children whose lives have been disrupted by war or other disasters receiving a school kit is a sign that someone far away cares. Adults in literacy classes appreciate the supplies needed to learn to read and write.

Include the following items in each School Kit:

- Four 70-80 sheet spiral-bound notebooks of wide- or college-ruled paper approximately 8"x 10 1/2"; NO LOOSE-LEAF PAPER
- One pair of blunt scissors (safety scissors with imbedded steel blades work well)
- One 30 centimeter ruler or a ruler with centimeters on one side and inches on the other side
- One pencil sharpener
- Five unsharpened #2 pencils with erasers; secure together with a rubber band
- Five black or blue ballpoint pens (NO GEL INK); secure together with a rubber band
- One box of 16 or 24 crayons
- One eraser approximately 2 ¹/₂ " long
- One sturdy drawstring backpack-style cloth bag approximately 14" x 17" with shoulder straps (NO STANDARD BACKPACKS) Recommended fabrics include sturdy cotton, canvas, denim and twill.

Do not add other items or leave out any of the items



listed. All items should be new and in good condition. Remove excess packaging, pack all items in the school bag and close. Do not enclose the Kit or any of its contents in plastic bags. Detailed instructions with pictures for sewing the school bags are available on the "in-FORM-ation" table in the Narthex.

PERSONAL CARE KITS

Clean hands, good grooming, bright and shining smiles – you can help bring them about through the gift of Personal Care Kits.

Include the following items in each Personal Care Kit:

- One light weight bath-size towel (20"x40" to 52"x27"), dark color recommended.
- Two bath-size bars of soap any brand in its original wrapping (4 to 5 oz bars)
- One adult-size toothbrush in its original packaging. Toothbrush multipacks may be used by sealing an individual toothbrush in a business envelope; no plastic bags or wrap.
- One sturdy comb, wide tooth preferred, remove Packaging.
- One metal nail clipper attached file optional, remove packaging.

Do not add other items or leave out any of the items listed. All items should be new and in good condition. Wrap all the items in the towel and tie the towel securely with ribbon or yarn. Do not enclose the Kit or any of its contents in plastic bags.



is located in THE GIVING PLACE (Arnold St. side annex of Luther's Place). Thank you.



- 3-year goal Family units have been enrolled into sustainability program and additional family units are being recruited; our self-sufficiency scores have increased by 20%
- 1-year goal our sustainability program has been developed and metrics for success have been established
- Success indicators
 - guests are satisfied with meeting their personal goals
 - implement self-sufficiency assessment tools
 - measurably reduce food insecurity
- Key milestones
 - one year goal is completed
 - · hiring of staff and certification in motivational interviewing
 - key partnerships established in the community

Sheltering:

Purpose - to establish a single site resource for individuals experiencing homelessness; the primary focus will be families but provide for single men and women as available. A single site location will support consistency for families and reduce ACEs.

- 3-year goal we have a single site shelter location including a resource center
- 1-year goal final board approval of a sheltering approach, location and program
- Success indicators
 - recidivism is reduced
 - reduce SDOH, emergency department visits, increase PCP visits
 - begin tracking referrals
 - implement self-sufficiency assessment tools
- Key milestones
 - complete one year goal
 - establish the current barriers to admission in current shelters
 - establish the vision of low-barrier shelter and coordination with FRESH Start

Best Practices:

Purpose - to ensure LCCM is executing the mission in the best possible way, using best practices or evidence-based practices, or processes validated for specific use in our community.

- 3-year goal all benchmarking and best practices have been included in all programs
- 1-year goal critical core processes have been identified, benchmarked with best practices and improvements needed are outlined
- Success indicators
 - consistent monitoring of industry standards
 - resources equal community demand
 - each program is evaluated for effectiveness, efficiency, and impact every other year
 - specific measurables are included in each program as appropriate
