I have heard that some are curious as to my reasoning, views, and feelings on various

current events. I am always happy to share the Lutheran theology and history on various topics. However, my approach to ministry is to remain as neutral as possible

with members when it comes to actual political affiliation. I certainly have personal beliefs which I may or may not choose to share at appropriate times. Overall, I feel Christ calls us to love one another, but also pray for our enemies whoever they may be. We can't go wrong doing our best to love one another, serve our neighbor, and pray for those we feel are against us.

The Voice of God

For hundreds of years, God spoke to the prophets in many ways. God spoke aloud, in dreams, on mountains, through callings, through nature, and in prayers. It seems that we have been dealing with lots of death lately. the journey from earthly life to be with God in the spirit is a sacred and holy journey. We have experienced the death of friends, loved ones, death of other' loved ones, some unexpected deaths and some deaths that we welcome due to pain and suffering.

Famine, wars, natural disasters, accidents, all happen every day in different parts of the world, and we cannot avoid the one thing that will eventually come to each of us: death. We associate our faith with Jesus as our Good Sheperd. However, our dying brothers and sisters in Christ, are not the only ones who we believe hear the Lord's voice. What does God's voice look like for us? How does the living Christ speak to us while we continue on our journey?

The scripture from John which has been on my mind often is John 10: 25, 27-30: "Jesus answered, 'I have told you, the works that I do in my Father's name testify to me, My sheep hear my voice. I know them, and they follow me. I give them eternal life, and they will never perish. No one will snatch them out of my hand. My Father, in regard to what he has given me, is greater than all, and no one can snatch them out of the Father's hand. The Father and I are one.'" Even as we continue in this life, God never lets us go. The Father, Son, and Holy Spirit are one. Each part of the Trinity guides us throughout our joys and our hardships.

In addition, we remember on the first Easter morning that the angel says, "He is not here. He has been raised!" from Matthew 28:6. As we journey from our earthly life into death, it is a holy journey. We remember that our loved ones are no longer here! They have been raised as saints of the Lord. We trust God walks with us in these moments whether we are left behind or we are the ones moving into the holy realm of God.

We pray, that in times of death and in hard times of life, when we walk through the valley that's God's



strong rod and staff comforts us. Our Good Sheperd is with us, he has never left us nor forsaken us. When we hear Jesus' words, "My sheep hear my voice. I know them, and they follow me. I give them eternal life, and they will never perish. No one will snatch them out of my hand." We hear strength. We hear a holy promise. After all, on Easter we read, "He is not here..." We remember that just as Christ was raised, we, too, hold onto a deep and everlasting hope that eternal life awaits us.

Some of our loved ones may not be here anymore, but we cling to a trust and faith that goes beyond our understanding. God's promises hold true from thousands of years ago and have never stopped. Each Sunday, we have tangible signs of God's covenant with God's people in the water and in the bread and wine.

Paul encourages us to have peace which goes beyond our comprehension, beyond our understanding. Peace, that we will be with one another again. Peace, that we will be held by our Lord, and peace, that we are and will be forever loved. Thanks be to God!

In the meantime, let us turn to God who holds us close, strengthens us, and whispers to our hearts. Let us turn to one another and allow ourselves to experience change, loss, and even grief. Come to church. Come to Bible study. Meet with your pastor. Call a friend! Look for ways to find gratitude and thankfulness for all we have now in the present moment. Thanks be to God for his blessings! Come, Lord Jesus, be our Shepherd always! Amen.



Highlights of Church Council Meeting, September 18, 2025

- For the month of July, Income was on the low side.
- Major Expenses on the Balance sheet were taken from Building & Maintenance Fund. This was for the computer upgrade at a cost of \$3058. There was a member donation of \$1500 that helped to offset this expense.
- For the month of August, the Income was average for the month.
- Major Expenses on the Balance sheet taken from Building & Maintenance Fund were for a \$5000 deposit for the new AC unit. This was a total of \$13,480.
- New members, John & Sallie Habecker, were installed on September 14.
- Blessing of the animals will be coming up on Thursday, October 2 at 7:00 p.m.
- Lunch and Learn on Wednesdays will start again for the month of October.
- Confirmation will be held on Sunday October 19.
- A major discussion for the Finance Committee meeting was the closing of the Fulton Financial Investment account for 223,717.85 and where this money should be re-invested.
- A decision was made to replace the motor in the Chancel AC for a cost of \$657 and to replace the Sanctuary (East) AC unit for a cost of \$13,480. and to enter into a complete AC maintenance contract for all units at a cost of \$2189 per year.
- The AC motor in the Chancel is not working. This can be replaced at a cost of \$657. The Sanctuary (East) AC unit is not working and can be replaced at a cost of \$13,480.
- The plasterer will be coming to fix the ceiling behind the organ.
- The carpet has been replaced in the 2nd floor meeting room.
- Beginner Bell choir needs more people. They lost 3 members.
- Pastor will do a healing service in November with anointing and prayers.
- Congregation Constitution Update. Neal is looking for 4 or 5 council volunteers to review the constitution and decide what needs to be adjusted. The updated version will be presented to the entire Council and then to the congregation at the Congregational meeting. This constitution is 10 years old.

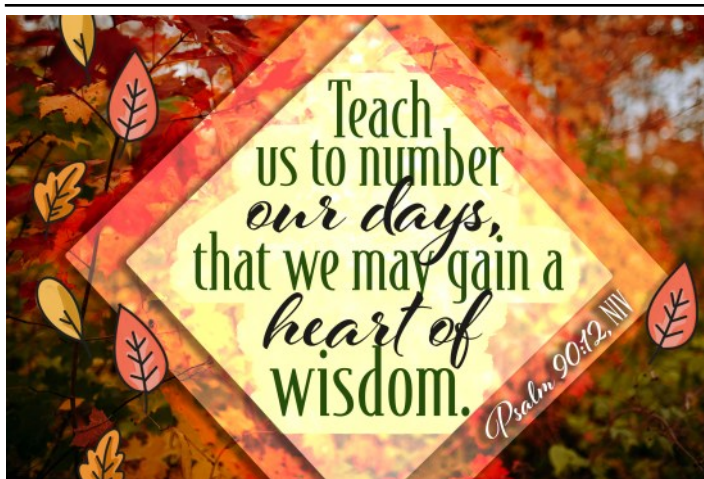


Harvest Home

Celebrate the season of gratitude by creating a colorful Thankful decoration.

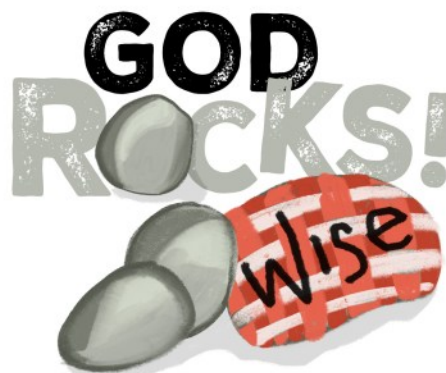
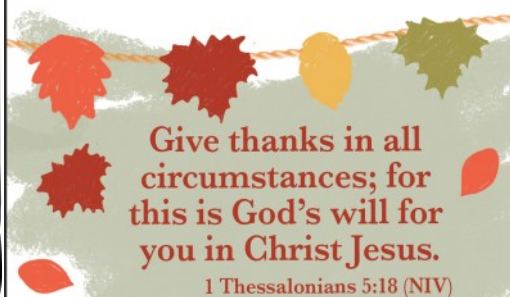
What you need:

- Construction paper in a variety of fall colors
- Pencil, marker, or crayons
- Yarn, ribbon, or raffia
- Scissors
- Hole punch
- Spray bottle filled with water
- Real leaves (Optional)
- Wooden or plastic beads, cereal with holes (Cheerios, Froot Loops, etc.), or any dried pasta with a hole (Optional)



What you do:

1. Draw or trace leaf shapes onto construction paper.
2. Lay the paper flat and spray with water until the paper is completely wet.
3. Crumple the wet paper into balls.
4. Open the paper and let the sheets dry flat.
5. When dry, cut out each leaf.
6. On each leaf, write the name of one person or thing you're thankful for.
7. Punch a hole in each leaf.
8. Lace the leaves, beads, cereal, and pasta onto the yarn, ribbon, or raffia.
9. Tie the ends and hang your garland.



Make decorative stones as reminders of God's many great attributes.

What you need:

- Flat, smooth stones
- Printed, decorative napkins
- Paintbrush
- Clear-drying craft glue
- Scissors
- Permanent marker



What you do:

1. Unfold the napkin, carefully separating the printed side from the solid side.
2. Brush a thin layer of glue atop a stone. Lay the napkin (printed side up) on the glue and press down. Paint more glue over the napkin. Let dry.
3. Turn the stone over and paint more glue on the back. Wrap the napkin edges around the stone, trimming as needed. Paint more glue over the napkin. Let dry.
4. On the stone, write an attribute of God (loving, wise, powerful, merciful, etc.).
5. Repeat with more stones. Use them as gifts, paperweights, table decorations, etc.

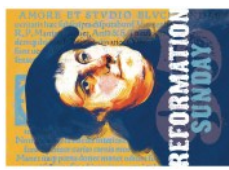
