- Four of our youth are celebrating their Affirmation of Baptism in October




- Pastor will be bringing back our Wednesday noon discussion group



# Devotional for September with excerpts from Searching for Sunday by Rachel Held Evans

Rachel Held Evans recounts the many ways Jesus talked about the reign of God:

Jesus didn't talk much about the church, but he talked a lot about the kingdom....

In contrast to every other kingdom that has been and ever will be, this kingdom belongs to the poor, Jesus said, and to the peacemakers, the merciful, and those who hunger and thirst for God. In this kingdom, the people from the margins and the bottom rungs will be lifted up to places of honor, seated at the best spots at the table. This kingdom knows no geographic boundaries, no political parties, no single language or culture. It advances not through power and might, but through acts of love and joy and peace, missions of mercy and kindness and humility. This kingdom has arrived, not with a trumpet's sound but with a baby's cries, not with the vanguishing of enemies but with the forgiving of them, not on the back of a warhorse but on the back of a donkey, not with triumph and a conquest but with a death and a resurrection....

When we consider all the messes the church has made throughout history, all the havoc she has wreaked and the things she has destroyed, when we face up to just how different the church looks from the kingdom most of the time, it's easy to think maybe Jesus left us with a raw deal. Maybe he pulled a bait and switch, selling us on the kingdom and then slipping us the church.

Evans names how the church is called to manifest the kingdom of God:

This word for church, ekklesia, was used at the time of Jesus to refer... to the people of God, assembled together. So church is, essentially, a gathering of kingdom citizens, called out—from their individuality, from their sins, from their old ways of doing things, from the world's way of doing things—into participation in this new kingdom and community with one another....

The purpose of the church, and of the sacraments, is to give the world a glimpse of the kingdom, to point in its direction....


In this sense, church gives us the chance to riff on Jesus' description of the kingdom, to add a few new metaphors of our own. We might say the kingdom is like St. Lydia's in Brooklyn where strangers come

together and remember Jesus when they eat. The kingdom is like the Refuge in Denver, where addicts and academics, single moms and suburban housewives come together to tell each other the truth. The kingdom is like Thistle Farms where women heal from abuse by helping to heal others....

And even still, the kingdom remains a mystery just beyond our grasp.... All we have are almost and not quite and wayside shrines. All we have are imperfect people in an imperfect world doing their best to produce outward signs of inward grace and stumbling all along the way.

Rachel Held Evans is a well-known public theologian who wrote many books and articles on faith, God's love, grace, and life experiences. Unfortunately, Evans passed away in 2019, but her legacy, strong faith, and Christian spirit lives on.

Dear Heavenly Father,



## September 24: The Astonishing Dawn Redwood by Dr. Len Eiserer

Finding a remnant population of supposedly extinct

Dawn Redwoods in a remote Chinese valley was one of the most important botanical discoveries of the 20th century. Join tree hobbyist Len Eiserer for a presentation about the incredible past, thriving present, and sparkling future of the Dawn Redwood, a living fossil.

Len Eiserer received his Bachelor's degree from the University of Maine and doctorate in Psychology from Bryn Mawr College. He's taught for 40 years and currently teaches at Harrisburg Area Community College (HACC). He maintains the website, Tree Treasurers of Lancaster County, and serves on the boards of the Friends of the Tanger and the Kaneko Arboretums.







## Seasons of Change, Signs of Grace

"While the earth remains, seedtime and harvest, and cold and heat, and summer and winter, and day and night shall not cease" (Genesis 8:22, NASB.)

As autumn begins, we watch the world transform before our eyes. Leaves change color, the air turns crisp, and a new rhythm settles in. In these seasonal shifts, we are reminded of God's faithful hand over all of creation.

Genesis 8:22 assures us that the cycles of nature—seedtime and harvest, summer and winter—are part of God's ongoing promise. Each season speaks of His order, care, and presence. Autumn, in particular, invites reflection. Just as the trees release their leaves, we are called to let go of what no longer serves us and make space for renewal.

This season also marks a return to routines—school schedules, church programs, and community events. As we step into new responsibilities or revisit familiar ones, may we do so with gratitude and trust. God is



not only present in the harvest but in the quiet letting go.

Let this autumn be a time to embrace God's steady rhythm, find beauty in change, and rest in His faithful promises that never cease—even as the world around us shifts.

## **Christian Symbol**

BURNING BUSH — In Exodus 3, God speaks to Moses from a bush that is burning but not consumed. When Moses asks what he should say if the Egyptians questions who sent him to lead the Israelites out of slavery, God states, "I AM



WHO I AM." Centuries later, when people wonder who Jesus is, his answers hint at his divinity: "I AM the light of the world; I AM the good shepherd; I AM the bread of life" and, perhaps most profoundly, "Before Abraham was, I AM" (John 8:58). On Pentecost, God's Holy Spirit comes upon the apostles as fire. Thus the burning bush is a powerful symbol of God's presence echoed through time.

Lord of all seasons, As the leaves change and the days grow cooler, help me embrace the rhythm of your creation. Teach me to let go of what I no longer need and to trust your timing in every part of life.

Start off the school year right by making this :// wipe-off board, which can help you remember important things.


## What you need:

- Adult help
- 5" x 7" picture frame with glass (available at a dollar store)
- Lined notebook paper
- Scissors
- Low-heat glue gun
- Buttons, ribbon, stickers or foam shapes
- 1" piece of Velcro
- Erasable marker

## What you do:

- 1. Using the cardboard insert or picture from the frame as a pattern, cut the notebook paper to fit the frame. Then insert it behind the glass.
- 2. Decorate the outside of the frame by gluing on buttons, ribbon, stickers or foam shapes.
- 3. Glue one side of the Velcro to the erasable pen and one side to the frame.

  Then attach the pen to the frame.
- 4. Place the board on your desk, dresser or kitchen counter. On the glass, write daily reminders about assignments and activities.




Create a simple and meaningful prayer box your family can use to share requests and pray together all week long.

## What you need:

- Shoebox with lid
- Wrapping paper or decorative paper
- Scissors & tape
- Markers or crayons
- Stickers and other craft material (optional)
- Pens or pencils
- Index cards or small pieces of paper

## What you do:

- Wrap the shoebox like a gift, wrapping the lid separately so it can be opened.
- As a family, decorate the box with drawings, favorite Bible verses, photos, or stickers.
- Place the box somewhere central, like the kitchen or living room.
- Keep index cards and pens nearby.
   When someone has a prayer request, they can write or draw it and drop it in.
- Throughout the week, take turns praying over the requests as a family, or have a parent lead prayer time.
