The items requested in March is **peanut butter and jelly.** Items can be brought to the church at any time and placed in the red shopping cart labeled "LCCM"



Highlights of Annual Congregational Meeting February 11, 2024

- On the Income side, we fell short of our budget goal for the year 2023 by approximately \$30,000. Brad reviewed our sources of income and stressed that we were able to meet our expenses only by relying on investment income. It is a goal of the church to meet these expenses through the Unified Offering of members of the congregation.
- Administration Cost of church offering envelopes was higher than budgeted since we switched to a new company during the year. The timing of the payments resulted in higher expenses during this budget year, but we will save money in the future with the new company.
- Operation and Maintenance In the Maintenance and Repair line item, we exceeded our budget due to several large expenses, including work on the furnace and the walk-in cooler, along with roof repairs. We also incurred significantly higher costs for gas, exceeding the budget by approximately \$7000.
- Worship and Music The only item of note was that we had the organ fully serviced and tuned by a new company.
- Christian Education The line item for Camping Scholarships is higher than the budgeted amount, but a significant portion of this expense is paid from Hershey Company stock dividends. This stock was bequeathed to the church for the sole purpose of providing camping scholarships.
- Other Categories Brad noted that the Social Ministry Committee donates \$2000 to community organizations each year. These donations are now grouped together as one item on the budget.
- Benevolence We continue to provide approximately 10% of our income to Synod/ELCA Mission Support. This amounted to approximately \$17,000 for the year.
- The proposed budget goal for 2024 is \$292,813.


- Brad briefly reviewed the Income side of the proposed budget, noting that the goal for Unified Offering is \$215,863. He again stressed that relying on investment income to meet expenses is not a good long-term practice.
- Administration Staff members will receive a 3% increase in salaries. The decrease in cost of church collection envelopes, as noted earlier, is reflected in the 2024 budget.
- Operation and Maintenance Budget for Maintenance and Repairs is increased to \$6000 due to higher costs and ongoing maintenance issues. Budgeted amounts for gas and electricity were also increased to reflect higher prices.
- Presentation of Candidates for 2024 Council: Louise Lundquist presented the candidates for the 2024 Church Council

Election to First Term - Jessie Green. Pam Gainer, and Henry Wampler. Election to Second Term - Lynn Kern.

Highlights of Church Council Meeting, February 15, 2024

- Council welcomed 3 new members: Pam Gainer, Jessie Green, and Henry Wampler
- \$1,500 given to church from Bazaar was earmarked for moving expenses of new pastor.
- Election of Council Officers for 2024: President -Neal Galbraith, Vice President - Louise Lundquist, Secretary - Nancy Brightbill
- Discussion regarding approval of Pastor to be our next pastor. The compensation package was discussed and approved.

And chickens are easy to breed so the gift can grow and multiply to help start a small business and generate a steady source of income, be shared with neighbors and ultimately make life better for a whole community. This Lent we invite you to

SUGGESTIONS FOR LENT

The forty days immediately preceding Easter have always been of deep significance to Lutherans. In a very real sense it is our period of revival. If we were perfect Christians, of course, we would not need to be "revived," but since none of us is perfect it is good for us, now and then, to pause in our feverish rush after worldly things and take the time to think seriously about the love God has shown us in Christ.

The season of Lent offers a fine opportunity to do this. It should be a time of deep penitence and mourning for one's sin, leading to a deepening of our spiritual lives.

There are a number of ways we may be helped to grow in grace through this season. Here are a few suggestions:

Read the Bible daily. At the center of our observance of Lent should be an earnest contemplation of the Passion of our Lord. Follow the life of Christ through at least one of the Gospels—the Gospel of Matthew, for example—or, preferably, through all four of them. The reading of even a few verses a day is better than reading none.

Pray daily. When you awaken in the

morning, when you retire at night, and every time you sit down to eat, say a prayer. There are countless other opportunities in every day when you can find time to pray. Try praying for one particular person each day for a week, and note the effects of such prayers. If your home does not have a period of family worship, try to have one during this season.

Attend church regularly. Prepare yourself for meaningful worship by getting sufficient sleep Saturday night, and by being in your pew for meditation before the Service begins. You will be surprised at how much more the services will mean to you if you begin each one with a prayer for the pastor, the worshipers, your family and yourself.

Talk Christianity. Why not talk about God, prayer, the Bible, and what Christ means to you and to the world? Why not try mentioning such subjects where you work, or study, or visit?

Of course, Lutherans do not value Lent for the sake of accumulating merit but only for Jesus' sake. If this season helps to make Christ supreme in our lives it has fulfilled its highest purpose.




EASTER ITEMS NEEDED
