# Council Notes

## Highlights of Church Council Meeting December 18, 2025

- The income for November was higher than normal at \$24,576.10
- Heather Buffington and Shannon Engle will fill in on the piano for Sundays during worship.
- Lent will be the next Bible study. Day of the week to be determined.
- Pastor is looking for opportunities to join with other youth and collaborate with another pastor in the confirmation process.
- The Congregational Care team meeting on 11/30/25 was a huge success. Many members who attended each picked the name of a shut-in to visit.
- On 12/17/25 the Personnel Committee met and will finish evaluations with staff in January.
- Sanctuary sound system has been much improved, and all wires have been removed from the floor.
- Christine Paradise resigned as organist.
- Synod Assembly will be held June 5 and 6, 2026 at the same place it was held last year.
- The plasterer was in a few times a week to apply plaster to the ceiling at the top of the stairwell behind the organ. Work continues.
- Finance Committee - Recommendation was made by the Finance Committee to the Church Council to implement a Counting Committee Chairperson/ Financial Secretary to count the money after worship. Ron Birch has offered to take on this task.
- Constitution Update – recommended changes:
  - ◊ Chapter 10 – Congregational Meetings – C10.04 – Recommend changing the minimum voting members that must be present to have a quorum at Congregational meetings from 50 voting members to 45 voting members.
  - ◊ Chapter 12 – Congregational Council – C12.01 – Recommend changing the numbers of maximum and minimum number of people on church council from a maximum of 22 and a minimum of 12 to a maximum of 15 and a minimum of 10.
- The Congregational Meeting will be held on January 25, 2026, immediately following worship.
- Next Meeting – Wednesday January 14, 2026 at 7:00 pm.



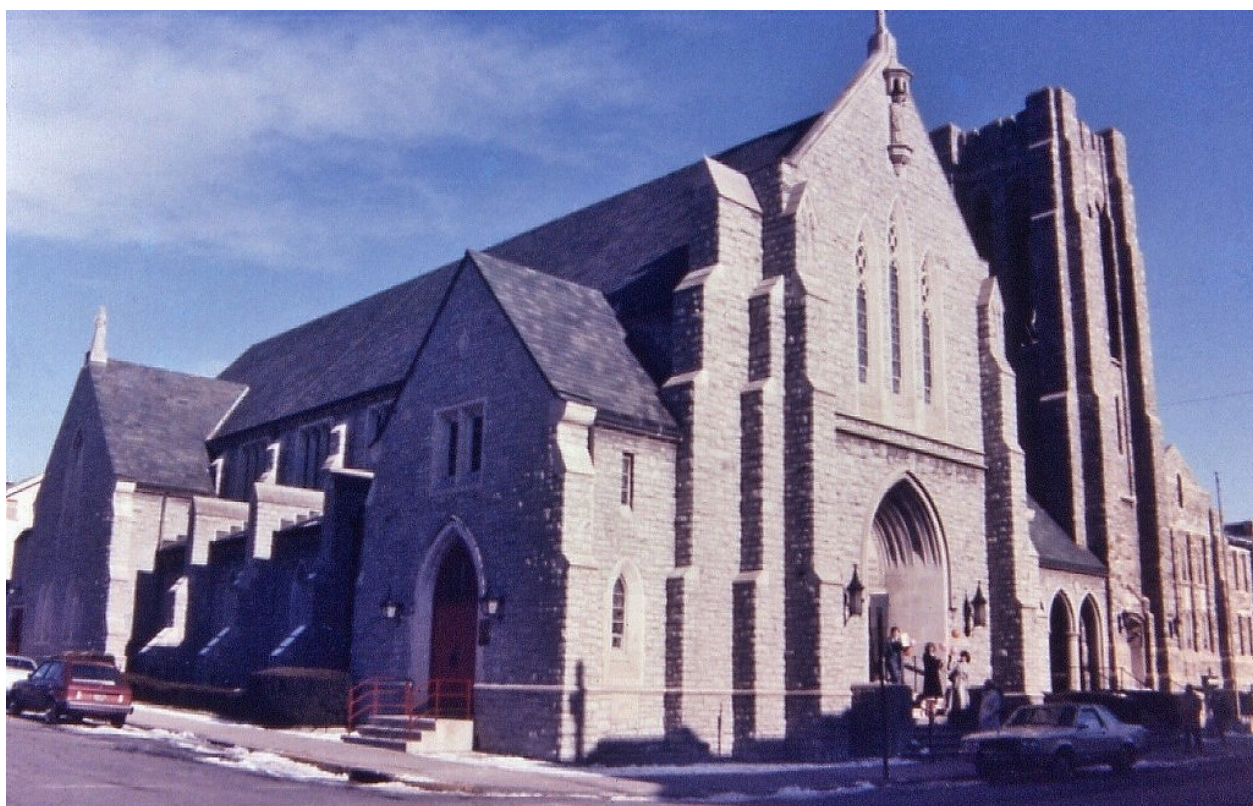


## From the Archives: Building of the Church

# Here's what's happening!

## Update on Holy Trinity's Archives & Artifacts

Recently, a committee was formed through a collaboration of retired historian Jim Dibert, who worked with artifacts at Historical Schaefferstown, Inc.'s museums and archeological sites, and retired library Betz Miller in consultation with Pastor Althea, who has worked with the archives at Susquehanna University, and our Church Administrator Stephanie Kaylor.

A distinction was made between archives (i.e., documents, photographs, and media materials) that were generated by church groups and actives no longer active and those generated by currently active church groups and activities. The committee's first task is to update and maintain active collections of archives currently being generated, while assigning to the proper collection occasional donations belonging to inactive archives.



The secondary task of the committee is to inventory, record, if necessary, reorganize archival collections and artifacts (i.e., three dimensional items of historical significance to Holy Trinity, which are often large and heavy) so that their location is readily accessible.

The committee's third, but very important, task is to ensure that both the archives and artifacts are properly stored and preserved. It has been determined that storage of our archives needs to be expanded beyond the current space available. A plan is currently underway.

## Exemplars of Faith

*Trinity Tidings' December issue told the story of St. Nicolas whose life exemplified the act of freely giving to those with a need. January's issue highlights another exemplar of faith.*

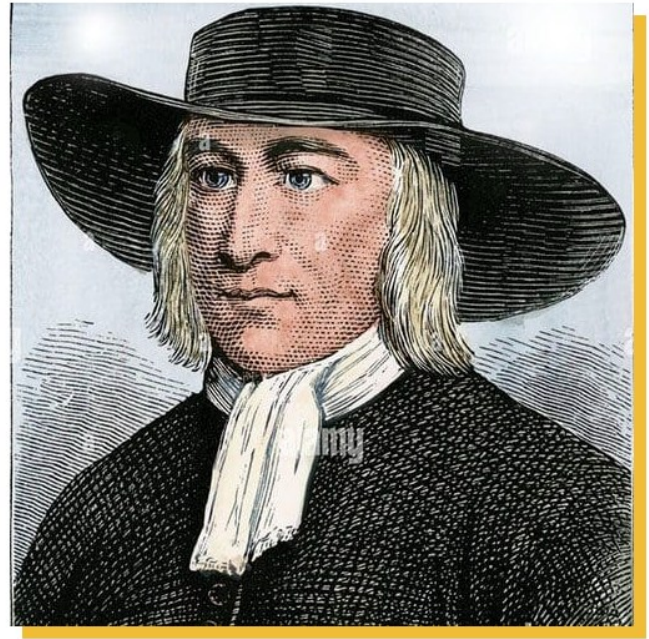
"Be still, then, acknowledge that I am God"  
(Psalm 46:10)

George Fox (1621-1691) experienced a spiritual crisis in 1644 when he was 23 years old. He had been disillusioned by the condition of the Church of England and the Puritans in Britain of his time. It seemed there was much insincerity, hypocrisy, futile formalism, and oppressive legalism wherever he looked. He wrote in his journal: "When all my hope in [the Churches] and all men had gone, so that I had nothing outward to help me, nor could I tell what to do. Then I heard a voice that said, "There is one, even Jesus Christ, that can speak to your condition, my heart did leap for joy."

From the Lutheran perspective, he had experienced a moment of grace which launched him on a life centered in Christ. He began preaching that it was possible to have a direct relationship with God who, if you allow him, will direct your life when you quietly listen and patiently wait for Christ to guide you. In the Christian tradition, this is known as contemplation.

As an open-air itinerant preacher, Fox's sermons were concerned with the application of the gospel in daily life. As his movement spread over all of Britain and his followers increased, he realized that he needed to organize them. Instead of forming another church with doctrines and rituals, he formed a Society of Friends who would regularly meet locally for spiritual growth and a mutual support. At these meetings those who attended would sit quietly in silent prayer and/or meditation on a passage of scripture. Anyone at anytime who felt called would stand and witness to a blessing, guidance, or an awareness given to them from God, public prayers of petition, intercession, thanksgiving, and praise might also be raised.

Two convictions put the Friends at odds with the conventional church and civil authorities. They refused to recognize society's accepted differences of social status, gender, and race that fostered inequality, since God treats everyone the same without distinction. And, they refused to take up arms at times of war or rebellion, since everyone carried the image of God within themselves; to engage in violence toward anyone was in effect to engage in violence toward God himself. It was claimed that when confronted with the "crimes" in court they "quaked."



Thus arose the common name for their society: "Quakers."

The most famous was William Penn. To cancel a debt that Charles II owed to his deceased father, who had been an admiral in the Royal Navy, the King granted William a charter for his own colony in America as a refuge for Quakers. To form a government for his colony William developed a philosophy of civil authority that is consistent with Luther's understanding of the place and function of civil authority under God. Pennsylvania's colonial government is considered the most enlightened government of its historical time period.

In 1688, a group of Quakers in Pennsylvania drafted and published the first declaration for the abolition of human slavery. (Interestingly, among the Quakers was Daniel Pastorius, a lawyer and the agent of a company of Frankford Lutheran "Pietists" – whose devotions brought them close to Christ; and they knew William Penn personally – that financed the settlement, in 1683, of Germantown in Penn's colony. The declaration brought fruit in 1780 when Pennsylvania's assembly passed a law that the children of enslaved people were free and could not be enslaved. The effect was that the abolition of slavery was completed. In Pennsylvania decades before the outbreak of the Civil War.

The Lutheran Church commemorates the life of George Fox on January 13<sup>th</sup>.

The Care Class will discuss this article on January 18<sup>th</sup> after worship service in the Social Room. Everyone interested in the discussion is welcome. Coffee and a snack are available as well.

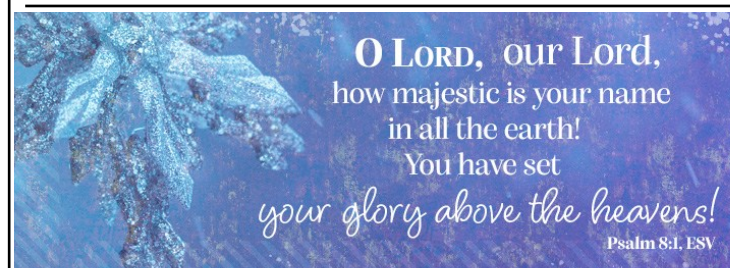


## Cleaning & Household Products for Agape Family Shelter 2026

The Women of the ELCA's first service project for 2026 is collecting cleaning and household products for the Agape Family Shelter in the city of Lebanon from January 4, 2026 to February 18, 2026.

Donations to be collected during this campaign include: paper towels, toilet tissue, Clorox wipes, 13 gallon tall kitchen trash bags, 33 gallon black drawstring trash bags, Lysol disinfectant spray (unscented, white can preferred), Pine Sol, Comet cleanser, dish detergents, sponges, scouring pads, paper plates, tea towels and HE laundry detergent. These "in kind" donations help to defray the shelter's maintenance costs thereby freeing up money for use to support programs to help their guests. The Agape Family Shelter provides a Christ-centered sanctuary for single women, pregnant women and mothers with children. Each woman who crosses their threshold is guided through an individualized plan for her future. From goal-setting and financial planning to parenting education and informal counseling, Agape Family Shelter empowers women with the life skills they need. ## January 28: Birding Pennsylvania’s State Parks by Chris Kemmerer

This diversity is also represented in the flora and fauna. 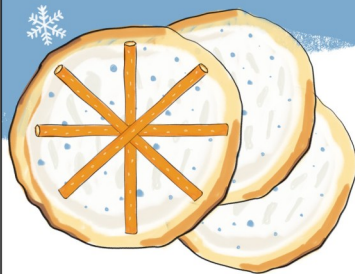

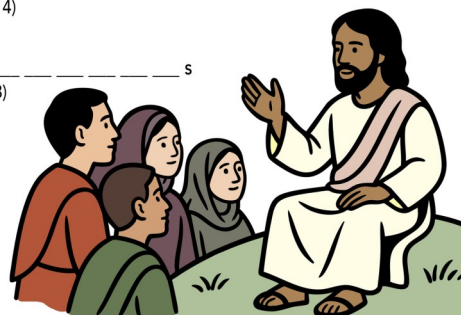
